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
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Operation Wallacea



Over the holidays, 20 students participated in Operation Wallacea, which saw them travel to a very remote part of Indonesia to learn to dive, participate in reef ecology courses, science workshops, reef restoration projects, beach cleans, visit a Bajau village and scuba dive in the coral triangle (the most biologically diverse coral reef in the world). They worked with people from all over the world, including a former Head of a UN mission to South Sudan, professors from Universities in England, masters students and PhD students from all over the world and school students from England and Taiwan. It was a fantastic trip, and the feedback from everyone we met was that our students were incredible. How they got involved, their sense of adventure, laughter, positivity, and overall approach to the experience was outstanding. They were a fantastic advertisement for the school and the community; honestly, and we are incredibly proud of them.




Arts Day

It was a brilliant opportunity to appreciate many different forms of art, a wonderful craft that many people take for granted in their everyday lives.






Primary Music

During music lessons in Art Week, Primary music classes experimented with sound. Ms McGrath set up a resonance experiment with a speaker under a large drum, sprinkled salt on a thin sheet of card, and played four contrasting pieces of music to see what patterns emerged in the salt—our very own twist on a chladni plate.

Students were then invited to interpret the patterns according to their own imaginations. Unlike pure tone experiments of this sort, the patterns were quite random rather than geometric. The artwork is also quite varied and interesting. This is just a small sample.

The four musical excerpts were from:

1. 1812 Overture, Tchaikovsky
2. A brass fanfare called Also Sprach Zarathustra, Richard Strauss
3. The William Tell Overture, Rossini
4. Student choice from contemporary bands (different for each class)

Round Square Conference - Rockhampton

A Round Square conference was held at Rockhampton Grammar School, attracting students from 17 schools worldwide. The event featured speakers discussing environmental issues and the work being done to address them. Students completed a 3-day rotation, divided into groups like Barramundi and Milbi. The Barramundi group visited the Fitzroy River in Rockhampton, while the Milbi group visited the green sea turtle, a significant totem for local indigenous people.

The three rotations included a Byfield Mini Canoe Expedition and Tea Tree Farm tour, a Great Keppel Island Day, and a re-vegetation program near Ritamada Outdoor Education Centre. The group helped with weed control, mulching trees, watering, and planting new trees. They also visited the school's Outdoor Education Centre, a resort with spectacular gardens.

The Round Square conferences provide students with new adventures and the opportunity to meet international students. Parsa, who has relocated to Melbourne, had a memorable experience at Geraldton Grammar School. The students enjoyed the experience and were grateful for the opportunity.



Year 12 Geography Camp



This year, we journeyed to Perth from Geraldton to study the urban places, processes and problems with Western Australia's ever growing capital.

We explored a diverse range of functions and suburbs in Perth, including Fremantle, Northbridge, South Perth, East Perth, and Ellenbrook. Our study encompassed the processes of heritage, urban sprawl, urban renewal, and invasion and succession, and we even found time to indulge in some retail therapy along Hay and Murray Street and the Perth Cultural Centre.

Although we received more rain in one day than Perth had the rest of the year, we still enjoyed our trip and learned a lot about cities, which will help our studies of Geraldton, New York, and Tokyo.


Students were excited to see artefacts collected from the wreck and fascinated by the arch symbolising our school.

Some outstanding results were achieved, with many of the students achieving a credit certificate or higher. We had a number of students achieve Distinctions and High Distinctions, placing them in the top 10% of their cohort.

Junior Science Olympiad Exam


